

OUR WORK IN WOKINGHAM

Domestic abuse services in Wokingham (DASS) are delivered by Cranstoun, a charity with over 50 years' experience of empowering people to live healthy, safe and happy lives.

DASS brings together an integrated range of programmes and interventions, each delivered by staff with specialist skills and experience supporting those affected by domestic abuse. This specialism allows us to deliver the best support possible for the Wokingham community.

The interventions include:

- · DASS outreach service
- · Seeking Safety/Freedom programme
- Men & Masculinities programme
- Children and young peoples' programme
- Refuge provision

Our services are available to victims and survivors of domestic abuse regardless of people's age, disability, gender, gender identity, race, religion or belief or sexual orientation

OUR PROGRAMMES

DASS Outreach Service

Support and advocacy service for 16+ year olds, working with those at risk of harm from intimate partners, ex-partners or family members. The service supports individuals to increase their safety and that of their children and is delivered by the way of a One-Stop-Shop, offering advice and support appropriate to the needs of each individual. The outreach service works with those from all genders and sexualities.

Seeking Safety

A 12-week programme for victim-survivors with safety as the overarching goal, helping clients attain safety in their relationships, thinking, behaviour and emotions.

Freedom

A 12-week domestic abuse course identifying the roles, attitudes and beliefs of the abuser, and helping victim-survivors make sense of what has happened to them.

Men & Masculinities

A programme designed to support men to make positive changes. An accompanying Women's Support Service provides support, empowerment and safety for women whose (ex-) partners are attending the Men & Masculinities programme.

Women and LGBT+ people wanting to change abusive behaviours

A 16-week one to one programme for women and LGBT+ people that are identified as the primary or predominant aggressor. This service also provides accompanying (ex-) partner support.

Children & Young Person's Programme

A 10-week one-to-one programme for children aged 9-18 years. The programme will cover the impact of domestic abuse on children and keeping children emotionally and physically safe. It will provide a safe space for children to play, express their feelings, build resilience and improve emotional health. For under-9's we offer one-to-one play and group therapy.

Fortis

A 12-week programme for male victimsurvivors of domestic abuse aimed at who have left an abusive relationship. Its key aim is making survivors of abuse feel safer.

LGBT+

A newly developed 12-week victim/survivors offer for those identifying as members of the LGBT+ community.
